### Tallit Program: A Time for Leaning and Connecting for 6th Graders and Families

Strings flying. Intense counting-and recounting. Proud grins of accomplishment. On September 19, 6th grade parents and students came together to learn about *tzitzit* and then, worked together in their families to tie *tsitsiyot* on the *tallitot* created from fabrics the students had chosen. By the end of the evening, the students were happiliy enwrapped in *tallitot* that demonstrated their individuality as well as the ties to past and present that will support them as they step into the future.

#### Hands-On Learning To Understand Plate Techtonics

Students studying plate tectonics and how the Earth is



changing in Earth science simulated the formation of volcanoes by heating a beaker filled with melted wax, sand, and water. Starting with a layer of wax already in the beaker, each group of students filled the beakers with a layer of sand and water. Students then heated their beakers on a hot plate and observed the changes. As the beakers heated up, the layer of wax began to melt and it burst through the layer of sand, rose through the water, and pooled on the surface of the beakers. Using their understanding of plate tectonics, students related each of the layers in the beaker to different densities of rock in the Earth. Students also used their understanding of convection to explain why

the hot wax rose through the sand and water to the surface of the beaker. As always, students practiced lab safety while carrying out the procedures in this experiment.
